26th Annual Madison County Hop Fest

CELEBRATE HOP HERITAGE

The Madison County Hop Fest celebrates the past, present, and prosperous future of the hop industry in Madison County and throughout NYS.



The Madison County Hop Fest celebrates over 200 years of hop heritage that began

in Madison County. It was in Madison County that James Coolidge from New England planted the 1st commercial hop yard on acres of farmland in Bouckville. He was also the first to transport hops to the New York City market in 1816. Thus, establishing a commercial agricultural connection between the hop fields of CNY and the agricultural commodity marketplace. (Cultural Resource Survey of Hop Heritage Sites in Madison County. Nell Ziegler, 2007. A survey funded by Preserve New York, a grant program of the Preservation League of New York State and the New York State Council on the Arts.) Many Madison County farmers followed in Coolidge's footsteps turning over their fields into commercial hop yards as did the farmers from neighboring counties - Montgomery, Schoharie, Chenango, Otsego, Herkimer, and Oneida. The Madison County Hop Fest is a signature event for Madison County and New York State, as there are no other fests that can make the historic claim that New York State's Hop Heritage began in their county. The Preservation Association of Central New York awarded the Madison County Historical Society with the 2021 CNY Heritage Award in recognition of the Annual Madison County Hop Fest.

The 26th Annual Madison County Hop Fest will feature a hop exhibit, a hop shop, vendors selling hop-related merchandise, raffles, food trucks.

At 12:00 pm, Al Bullard will take his post in the Carriage Barn at the Bittersweet: Hop Culture in Central New York exhibit. Bullard, the author of The Hop Farmer's Year: The Seasons, Tools & Methods of Hop Growers in New York State's Golden Age of Hops, will identify tools and equipment from specific manufacturing locations in Madison,



Oneida, Otsego, and Schoharie counties. Bullard earned his B.S. in history from Lebanon Valley College and his M.A. in Folklife Studies and Museum Management from the Cooperstown Graduate Program of the State University of New York at Oneonta. His interest in hops began in graduate school and since then he has collected the stories, tools, and artifacts of New York's hop heritage. He has written extensively on the subject, given lectures, and participated in seminars and Hop Fests. Bullard is a retired teacher from Cooperstown Central School. Bullard was crowned Madison County Hop King in 2002. Copies of his book will be available for sale.

Restoration Projects

TERNE-COATED TIN ROOF RESTORATION PROJECT COMPLETED

The Terne-coated Tin Roof Restoration project has been completed. In the spring of 2021, The Madison County Historical Society received a \$5,000 grant from the Pomeroy Fund for NYS History, a partnership between William G. Pomeroy Foundation and the Museum Association of New York. The grant addressed the damage to the Historical Society's side porch terne-coated tin roof caused by the snow and ice build-up that occurred during the winter of 2020. The project was delayed in 2021, due to the rainy weather and scheduling conflicts with our contractor, W. L. Rieben who is in high demand for his expertise and beautiful workmanship. The Historical Society's project commenced in June of 2022 and was completed in early July due to supply chain issues. Due to the extensive damage to the roof, the restoration project cost was \$9,000. With the funding support received from the Pomeroy Fund for NYS History, a partnership between the William G. Pomeroy Foundation and the Museum Association of New York grant, and the \$4,000 we received in donations from our members we raised enough funds and completed the repair of the terne-coated tin roof.

FROM "COBBLESTONE BUILDINGS IN MADISON COUNTY"

History of the Landmark Tavern in Bouckville

The history of the beautiful and historic Landmark Tavern building begins with the efforts to procure a canal route from Binghamton to Utica. This route would join the coal fields of Northern Pennsylvania with the recently-opened Erie Canal. The farms, hamlets and villages of the Chenango and Oriskany river valleys, through which the proposed canal was to be constructed, had the potential for great prosperity if this new transportation route were built.

The canal would also bisect the Third Great Western Turnpike (today's Rt. 20), which ran through the hamlet of Johnsville. Johnsville was later renamed Bouckville. Johnsville in the 1820's and 1830's was a small cluster of homes and businesses, mainly on the eastern end of the hamlet. The western end of present-day Bouckville (formerly Johnsville) was referred to as a "cedar swamp" in newspaper accounts of the 1820's.

Farms in the area had originally been established on the hillsides to avoid disease-carrying mosquitos. The construction of a canal offered the chance to drain the swamps and create lowland farms that could use the rich alluvial soil of the Bouckville area.

The Shelf Clock Makers of Madison County – A Reprise

INTRODUCTION

Back in the annals of time, well, actually starting back in 1980, this author penned a series of three articles on 19th Century Madison County clock makers for the Madison County Heritage, including Shelf Clock Makers, Tall Clock Makers, and Town (Tower) Clock Makers. The following is a reprise of the shelf clock maker piece. One would expect that after 40 years, a researcher of any skill level would be able to come up with something new. The truth is that virtually all of the original primary source research – deeds, birth, deaths, contemporary documentation, etc. has turned out to be pretty immutable, and those facts will be recounted here, with additions as available. What is new is the fact that the intervening four decades have afforded the writer with the opportunity to see, and in some instances collect, more and widely varying examples of the art of these makers. Some of those will be shared herein; many more were included in a display of Madison County shelf clocks in November and December, 2021 at Cottage Lawn

The antique clock is a romantic legacy of seemingly simpler days and years gone by. Glancing at the face of an old clock one sees not only the reflection of people, places and events long forgotten, but also a product of incomparable construction and craftsmanship.

Some of the hands and skills that fashioned early American clocks came from Madison County!

L. & J. FRISBIE & CO. – CHITTENANGO, MADISON COUNTY

Levi and James Frisbie, born at Wolcott, Connecticut in 1790 and 1798, respectively, offered the first shelf clocks with Madison County labels in the early 1830s. The labels used in their short-case clocks state "IMPROVED CLOCKS / MANUFACTURED / BY / L. & J. FRISBIE & CO. / CHITTENANGO, MADISON CO., N.Y." Their large cases sold with wood movements designed to run for 8 days on a winding carry the label "IMPROVED / EIGHT DAY / CLOCKS / MADE AND SOLD / BY

/ L. & J. FRISBIE & CO. / CHITTENANGO, MADISON COUNTY, N.Y." The "Eight Day" notation was omitted from the labels on their large case clocks with 30-hour movements. Isaac Lyons, local printer and publisher of the Chittenango Herald, was the label printer.







12th Annual Peterboro Emancipation Day

The 12th Annual Peterboro Emancipation Day was held Saturday, August 6, 2022 at The Barn on the Gerrit Smith Estate National Historic Landmark, a site on the National Park Service Network to Freedom, the National Underground Railroad trail.

Bobbie Reno presented a special rendition of her children's book Edmonia Lewis: A Sculptor of Determination and Courage which she authored and illustrated.

Reno has resided near Albany NY her entire life, serving as a county clerk and as a clerk for an NYS senator. She became the East Greenbush NY historian in 2016 and began to research Edmonia Lewis which led the Reno's advocacy for Lewis. In 2017, Bobbie led a successful fundraiser to restore the grave of Edmonia Lewis in London, England. Bobbie contacted Oberlin College in November 2020 to request Oberlin consider bestowing an Honorary Degree on Edmonia. On June 5, 2022, Oberlin College granted Edmonia her actual Diploma in the Ladies Course. Reno petitioned the United States Postal Service to issue a commemorative stamp for Edmonia Lewis as part of the Black Heritage series. The stamp was issued on January 26, 2022.

Edmonia Lewis was born in 1844 to a Chippewa woman and a Haitian man. Lewis lived with her maternal aunts after the early deaths of her parents. In 1856 Edmonia attended New York Central College in McGraw, Cortland County NY. Chartered in 1848, Central College was the first college in the nation founded to accept persons of all colors and both sexes. Gerrit Smith was a benefactor of Central College. When the college faced bankruptcy in 1858, Smith purchased the college, and then gave it back to the trustees in 1860. Lewis attended Oberlin College in Ohio from 1859 to 1863, departing when wrongly accused of poisoning two




classmates. She moved to Boston and then lived in England and Rome developing her sculpturing. Gerrit Smith wrote in his journal, "August 23, 1872, Edmonia Lewis (artist) of Rome, Italy, comes to take the first steps toward putting my statue in marble. I am surprised and not pleased by it. September 3, Edmonia leaves us." Smith's disinclination to a statue (a project conceived by his friends) prevailed. Edmonia made a plaster cast of the clasped right hands of Gerrit and Ann Smith, and later in her studio in Rome, she carved the hands in marble. The sculpted hands are among the collection at the Madison County Historical Society and were on view for this special occasion.

Emancipation Day Co-chair Max Smith concluded the program with an update on the project Songs of Slavery and Emancipation, a film, book, and CD that debuted simultaneously in New York City and Peterboro on June 18, 2022.

In the 1800s women would repurpose worn textiles, saving wool scraps to create colorful fabric home décor. A penny rug is made by layering circles of wool, using a coin as a template to trace the circular shape, hence the term penny rug. The penny rug was not necessarily used as a rug in the home. It was quite often created to be used as a decorative piece for a shelf, wall hanging, or used as a table runner.

Madison County Historical Society's Heritage Handicrafts: Holiday Penny Rug Ornament Workshop is part of a series of leisure arts workshops designed to engage and involve participants in Fine Arts and Crafts activities common in the 19th century, with a focus on making cultural connections to creative pastimes, which are still relevant today.

The Madison County Historical Society is collaborating with the Historical Society of Early American Decoration (HSEAD) member artists who will be leading a series of workshops at the Madison County Historical Society. HSEAD is a not-for-profit national organization whose mission is to perpetuate and expand the unique skills and knowledge of Early American Decoration through educational workshops, research, publishing, and exhibitions. Sandy Rolewicz is an associate member of the Historical Society of Early American Decoration who teaches workshops around the region. She has been sewing since the 7th grade, creating her first penny rug in 1993 from a pattern in the Early American Life Magazine. She devotes much of her time to braiding rugs and woolen mittens from upcycled wool sweaters. She exhibits her work throughout the region and has been recognized for her artistry, winning several blue ribbons at the NY State Fair in the penny rug class and has been awarded best in the show for two of her penny rugs. She is a member of the James Dean Chapter of Questers, serving for many years as program chairwoman, past president, secretary, and treasurer. She is also a member of the Westmoreland Historical Society, presently serving as secretary on the board. Sandy opened her own antique shop, Just Like Grandma's, in Lairdsville in 1991 where she specializes in chair seating-cane, rush, shaker tape, and reed seats. Sandy is also politically active in her community, as an election inspector.

Hops Historian Brings Exhibits to 26th Annual Madison County Hop Fest

Saturday, September 17 • 12 - 2 pm

Albert C. Bullard, a retired social studies teacher and former antique dealer and appraiser, will exhibit artifacts related to 19 C. hop growing in the Bittersweet hop heritage exhibit as part of Hop Fest. Bullard invites folks who are looking for explanations of antique tools to bring the tools for his identification. He will also have his book The Hop Farmer's Year: The Seasons, Tools, and Methods of Hop Growers in New York State's Golden Age of Hops. Al likes collecting hop farming tools, comparing the different varieties, and demonstrating how the tools work.

Al Bullard, from Milford in Otsego County NYS, has been a consultant for hop exhibits in New York State, as well as for the American Hop Museum in the state of Washington. His keen interest in hops began with an assigned experience as a student in the Cooperstown Museum Graduate Program at which time he found a building that turned out to be a hop house! Bullard is familiar with most of the remaining 19th C. hop houses in New York State and has generously shared his information in programs and tours. Bullard was crowned the Madison County Hop King in 2005 due to his four decades of hop culture studies and collections, as well as for participation in the Madison County Hop Fest for many years.
