

## News from 100 years ago

From the Oneida Dispatch Friday Morning January 23, 1925

R.J. FISH HEADS HIST'L SOCIETY

Daniel Keating Succeeds S.A. Maxon As Secretary

Other Officers Elected at the Annual Meeting – Funds On Hand Total \$4,441.65—Secretary Maxon's 25th and Last Annual Report

Hon. Robert J. Fish was elected president of the Madison County Historical Society at the annual meeting in the Presbyterian church house on Wednesday evening. The other officers are:

Vice presidents, Mrs. Theodore Coles, Mrs. Edward A. Kiley and Rev S.R. MacEwan; secretary, Daniel Keating to succeed Samuel A. Maxon, who declined re-election; treasurer, Henry D. Fearon; librarian, Mrs. George Schubert; executive committee, Edwin J. Brown, Dr. A.V. Needham and Mrs. Orrin E. Bonney.

The treasurer's report showed a total balance on hand of \$4,441.65. By resolution \$300 was transferred from the general fund to the interest account. A number of donations were received, including a copy of the 25th anniversary program of the Knights of Columbus from Daniel Keating, a collection of newspaper clippings on the late Charles S. Fairchild of Cazenovia by Mr. Maxon, and another collection on various subjects arranged by William S. Leete. About 50 persons were present and a pleasant social time was enjoyed. Owing to illness Freeman A. McIntyre of Eaton was unable to attend and deliver his address. Three new members were elected—L.E. Lounsbury of Los Angeles, Cal., and Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Park.

#### Secretary's Report

The feature of the evening was the annual report of Samuel A. Maxon, which was notable both because of its splendid review of the past year and because it marked his retirement from the office of secretary after a faithful, efficient and consecutive service of a quarter of a century. Mr. Maxon has been the recording secretary of the Society ever since its organization 25 years ago, and his refusal to accept another re-election is a mate of general regret. His report follows:

#### Mr. President and Members of the Society:

This evening's pleasing occasion signalizes the existence of this Historical organization for its first quarter of a century, this being my 25th annual report as Secretary.

Our last annual meeting, as will be vividly remembered, was held at St. John's parish house on the evening of January 16. Aside from the routine business, the chief special feature was an interesting address by Hon. W. Pierrepont White of Utica, his subject being the proposed celebration of the 150th anniversary of the American Revolution and the historic events leading up to the achievement of victory.

A somewhat strange coincidence rests in the fact that Mr. White was recording secretary of the Oneida Historical Society, Utica, at the time Gen. Charles W. Darling (April 20, 1898) spoke before a few enthusiastic Oneidans who took the first successful step in the organization of the Madison County Historical Society.

The article continues at great length. Two columns over the headline reads "Total Eclipse of the Sun Tomorrow" that includes the note that "The next following one visible in this part of the country will be in 2024."
